Educating for Intelligent Belief or Unbelief - Nel Noddings 1993

One of the most enduring and controversial issues in American education concerns the place of individual beliefs and moral standards in the classroom. Noddings argues that public schools

should address the fundamental questions that teenagers inevitably raise about the nature, value and meaning of life (and death), and to do so across the curriculum without limiting such existential and metaphysical discussions to separate religion, philosophy or even history classes.
