*Sinners in the Hands of an Angry God* - Jonathan Edwards 2019-08-15

Preached at Enfield, Connecticut on July 8, 1741, this is perhaps the greatest sermon ever preached in America—and is certainly among the most well known. Owing to its forthright dealing with God's wrath and His intense hatred of sin and the sinner, it is also one of the most controversial. Indeed, for more than three-quarters of the sermon Edwards lays down a relentless stream of the most vivid and horrifying descriptions of the danger facing unregenerate men. While it is difficult to read

such graphic language, there is abundant hope in the sermon's conclusion. When local contacts tipped off Nigel Barley that the Dowayo circumcision ceremony was about to take place, he immediately left London for the village in northern Cameroon where he had lived as a field anthropologist for 18 months. The Dowayos are a mountain people that perform their elaborate, fascinating and fearsome ceremony at six or seven year intervals. It was an opportunity that was too good to miss, a key moment to test the balance of tradition and modernity. Yet, like much else in this hilarious book - the circumcision ceremony was to prove frustratingly elusive. This very failure, compounded by the plague of caterpillars of the book's title allows Nigel Barley to concentrate on everyday life in Dowayoland and the tattered

remnants of an overripe French colonial legacy. In the meantime, witchcraft fills the Cameroonian air, a man is lied to by his own foot and an earnest German traveller shows explicit birth-control propaganda to the respectable tribespeople. Beneath the joy and shared laughter in this comic masterpiece lies skilful and wise reflection on the problems facing people of different cultures as they try to understand one another. *A Plague of Caterpillars* is the second in Barley's trilogy of anthropological journeys that began with *The Innocent Anthropologist* and ended with *Not A Hazardous Sport* (all published by Eland).

**Normative Intermittency** - Gregor Fitzzi

2022-07-16

This book addresses the manifold crisis of current societies and understands it as a failure of normative social structuration. As an exemplar for this development, it analyses the decline of welfare state models and the corresponding societal compromise. Yet, it evaluates them as a symptom of a wider malaise of normative orders in complex societies. The question thus arises as to how social science can study the ongoing societal transformation. The book frames the phenomenon as 'normative intermittency' to capture its fluid alternation of social structuration and destructuration and develops its analysis in three steps: first, it draws a theoretically reflected symptomatic of its occurrences; it then establishes the sociological diagnosis necessary to understand its unfolding and finally evaluates its political outcomes. Methodologically, the book advocates a complete overhaul of the analytical frames of sociology to gauge the intermittent rhythm of the ongoing societal transformation. Thus, it develops an innovative reading of classical sociological theory beyond a number of unreflected axiomatic assumptions of the current sociological mainstream. Thanks to the assessment of the political outcomes of failing

social structuration the book turns to a discussion of the development of possible emancipation paths in the form of 'transformative social action'; reflexively, this accounts for the results of the sociological diagnosis of the crisis of normative social orders. The main analyses within the book scrutinise a number of empirical phenomena that establish normative intermittency in current societies and refer to the major debates that are taking place on the related topics in the state of art of sociological and political theory.

Spanish is the main, usually the sole official language of twenty-one countries, and it is set fair to overtake English by the year 2000 in numbers of native speakers. This vast geographical and political diversity ensures that Spanish is a good deal less unified than French, German or even English, the latter more or less internationally standardized according to either American or British norms. Until the 1960s, the criteria of internationally correct Spanish were dictated by the Real Academia Espanola, but the prestige of this institution has now sunk so low that its most solemn decrees are hardly taken seriously - witness the fate of the spelling reforms listed in the Nuevas normas de prosodia y ortografia, which were supposed to come into force in all Spanish-speaking countries in 1959 and, nearly forty years later, are still selectively ignored by publishers and literate persons everywhere. The fact is that in Spanish 'correctness' is nowadays decided, as it is in all living languages, by the consensus of native speakers; but consensus about linguistic usage is obviously difficult to achieve between more than twenty independent, widely scattered and sometimes mutually hostile countries. Peninsular Spanish is itself in flux.

**Nineteen Eighty-Four** - George Orwell 2021-01-09

"Nineteen Eighty-Four: A Novel", often published as "1984", is a dystopian social science fiction novel by English novelist George Orwell. It was published on 8 June 1949 by Secker & Warburg as Orwell's ninth and final book completed in his lifetime. Thematically, "Nineteen Eighty-Four" centres on the consequences of totalitarianism, mass surveillance, and repressive regimentation of persons and behaviours within society. Orwell, himself a democratic socialist, modelled the authoritarian government in the novel after Stalinist Russia. More broadly, the novel examines the role of truth and facts within politics and the ways in which they are manipulated. The story takes place in an imagined future, the year 1984, when much of the world has fallen victim to perpetual war,

omnipresent government surveillance, historical negationism, and propaganda. Great Britain, known as Airstrip One, has become a province of a totalitarian superstate named Oceania that is ruled by the Party who employ the Thought Police to persecute individuality and independent thinking. Big Brother, the leader of the Party, enjoys an intense cult of personality despite the fact that he may not even exist. The protagonist, Winston Smith, is a diligent and skillful rank-and-file worker and Outer Party member who secretly hates the Party and dreams of rebellion. He enters into a forbidden relationship with a colleague, Julia, and starts to remember what life was like before the Party came to power.

**A Functioning Society** - Peter F. Drucker 2017-07-05

Peter F. Drucker may be best known as a writer on business and management, but these subjects were not his foremost intellectual concern.

Drucker's primary concerns were community, in which the individual has status, and society, in which the individual has function. Here he has assembled selections from his vast writings on these subjects. This collection presents the full range of Drucker's thought on community, society, and political structure and constitutes an ideal introduction to his ideas. The volume is divided into seven parts. The selections in parts 1 and 2 were mostly written during World War Two and in the wake of the Great Depression. Part 3 deals with the limits of governmental competence in the social and economic realm. It contains some of Drucker's most influential writings concerned with the difference between big government and effective government. The chapters in part 4 explore autonomous centers of power outside government and within society. Part 5 contains chapters from Drucker's path-breaking work on the corporation as a social organization rather than merely an economic one. The rise of the so-called "knowledge industries" forms the background for part 6. The concluding part 7 is devoted entirely to Drucker's long essay "The Next Society." Drucker examines the emergence of new institutions and new theories arising from the information revolution and the social changes they are helping to bring about. In organizing these representative writings, Drucker chose to be topical rather than chronological, with each excerpt presenting a basic theme of his life's work. As is characteristic of his efforts, *A Functioning Society* appeals both the general reader as well as a cross-disciplinary scholarly readership.

*Trilce* - César Vallejo 2000-10

A highly-praised translation of a seminal work of Spanish literature is once again available. Winner of the Harold Morton Landon Translation Award (2001) César Vallejo was born in Peru in 1892. In 1921 he spent three months in prison where he wrote some of the poems in *Trilce*. In 1923 he left for Paris, where he co-founded a cell of the Peruvian Communist Party. He traveled to Russia, and to Spain during the Spanish Civil War. He died in Paris in 1938, in absolute poverty, devastated by the fall of the Spanish Republic. *Trilce*, published the same year as Eliot's *Waste Land* and also masterpiece of early modernism, is a ground-breaking work that has had an indelible effect on all subsequent poetry in its language. It contains 77 poems considered to be Vallejo's most complex and radical work.

Simplemente es una aproximación a los hechos, desde la óptica de un estudioso del medio social, de sus actores, de sus cambios y de sus transformaciones sociales. La población hispana en Estados Unidos está cambiando rápidamente debido a diferentes tendencias de migración, educación y crecimiento, de acuerdo al informe del Pew Research Center, publicado en septiembre del 2017. Según el informe, la población hispana en Estados Unidos alcanzó un nuevo récord en 2016 con 57,5 millones de personas, un crecimiento de 7,5 millones de personas respecto a 2010, cuando había 50,8 millones. Esto significa que la población hispana en este país actualmente es de 18.1%. En las páginas interiores del libro, presento un breve resumen de la historia del estado, la fundación de esta ciudad, seguida de las primeras migraciones europeas que llegaron a Pensilvania y las que se establecieron en Hazleton a raíz del apogeo de la industria de carbón antracita. El declive de esa industria, la creación de un modelo económico de desarrollo (CAN DO) y el posterior asentamiento de los inmigrantes hispanos. Desde que los hispanos empezaron a establecerse a mediados de la década del 80's y de una forma más numerosa en la década del 90's; esta ciudad experimentó un choque cultural que posteriormente fue más evidente a partir del flujo migratorio de residentes de los estados de New York, New Jersey y Massachusetts a principios de la década del 2000. Actualmente, la población mayoritaria de esta ciudad, es hispana. Se estima que para el 2023, los hispanos en esta ciudad, seremos más del 75% de la población. El proceso de aculturación o asimilación cultural ha sido lento, pero se pueden apreciar ciertos elementos de cambios, que dan cuenta de que poco a poco ambas comunidades van entrando en una relación de integración y de respeto mutuo. Por supuesto, persisten elementos de tensión y resistencia en muchos de los nativos de esta ciudad, pero intuyo que a medida en que la interacción aumente, tendremos más cosas en común y los proyectos se encaminarán hacia ese propósito. Los seres humanos tendemos a cerrarnos a lo nuevo como un mecanismo

inconsciente de protección o defensa y eso hace que nos tome más tiempo en asumir la realidad que toca a nuestra puerta para transformarla. Pero la experiencia ha demostrado que a pesar de los elementos negativos que supone el crecimiento poblacional, hay más elementos positivos y eso nos anima a seguir mejorando nuestro entorno y a darnos cuenta que, como comunidad multicultural, podemos aprender unos de otros, cuando somos capaces de aceptar las diferencias culturales. Les invito a que conozcan un poco más, algunos de los acontecimientos que he considerado importantes para entender cómo ha sido el encuentro cultural nativos e hispanos. Al fin y al cabo, cada lector por vivencia o por curiosidad, completará la historia con otras lecturas y testimonios.
